



Theology of the Body reflects on humanity and divinity

In Advent we celebrate the two comings of Christ: the first at His birth, the second at the end of time. For John Paul II, the birth of Christ is proof of God's spousal love for us. In becoming human, Christ literally marries divinity and humanity in His Person, "two in one flesh."

In His second coming we celebrate the humanity of Christ, resurrected and glorified, with the full divinity, power, and authority, as Son of Man. This gives us hope of the ultimate destiny and meaning of the human body.

The Theology of the Body is a catechetical summary of our faith, given to us by Pope John Paul II as a reflection on what it means to be human, created "in the image and likeness of God." Through Christ's teaching on marriage we come to the ultimate truth about our humanity. It is startling to realize that, in Christ, we become fully sacred and exalted so as to be higher than angels!

Pope John Paul II never tired of quoting two key statements from the Vatican Council document, The Church in the Modern World.

The first statement is: "Christ, the final Adam ... fully reveals man to man himself and makes his supreme calling clear" (#22).

In this we understand that, through the Incarnation, theology is not only about God but about man. Christ not only reveals God the Father to us, but He reveals to us our own humanity, created as "very good," so sacred as to give God's life to others as well. Christ gives us an authentic template and model of genuine humanity.

The second statement is: "Man is the only creature on earth which God willed for itself, [and he] cannot fully find himself except through a sincere gift of himself" (#24).

Moral teachings of the Church are in accord with human dignity by Bishop Robert Vasa

The Office of Readings for the 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time contains one of my favorite and most challenging passages. Citing from the "Pastoral Guide of Pope Saint Gregory the Great," the reading contains these words: "A spiritual guide should be silent when discretion requires and speak when words are of service. Otherwise he may say what he should not or be silent when he should speak. Indiscreet speech may lead men into error and an imprudent silence may leave in error those who could have been taught. Pastors who lack foresight hesitate to say openly what is right because they fear losing the favor of men. As the voice of truth tells us, such leaders are not zealous pastors who protect their flocks, rather they are like mercenaries who flee by taking refuge in silence when the wolf appears."

I have just returned from the annual educational conference of the Catholic Medical Association at which I again heard, from the medical and scientific community, that the teachings of the Catholic Church are fully in accord with a proper philosophical understanding of man and with the prudent practice of the healing arts. I was reminded again that bishops and priests, as shepherds, are perhaps a bit reluctant to speak to our secular and relativistic culture those truths which could perhaps be described as "inconvenient." The theme of the conference was "Theology of the Body: The Dignity of Woman." Starting with the series of talks by Pope John Paul II, in which he presented a rather comprehensive theology of the body, the conference presenters pointed out how this teaching interfaces with the practice of medicine.

As you can imagine, the Theology of the Body is fully consistent with the moral teachings of the Church. For example, there was a presentation on the use of the contraceptive pill as the medicine of choice for the impairment of fertility and the treatment of a variety of ailments which women might experience. In keeping with the theme of the dignity of women it was pointed out that many studies confirm the significant increase in the risk of breast cancer for women who use the contraceptive pill. The conclusion: The pill is not good for women. Furthermore, another presenter pointed out that the contraceptive pill, because it is a type of hormonal therapy, is used to treat the symptoms of a whole series of other underlying problems. Some of these, because they go undiagnosed, cause even more serious problems in the future. The pill may be convenient but it is not


good morality when it is used contraceptively and it is not good medicine when used therapeutically.

Contraceptive tubal ligations are morally illicit and it is hard to imagine a tubal ligation which is not contraceptive. Such surgeries are a violation of the integral dignity of women, they further promote the objectification of women and there are sometimes serious adverse health consequences.

In vitro fertilization, also known as IVF, is frequently used as a means for a couple to achieve a desired pregnancy. This process diminishes the dignity of both the man and the woman, it objectifies both of them, and it even objectifies the child to be conceived. In some ways that child, who has a right to be born of natural processes in the context of the embrace of love, now becomes the manipulated product of laboratory technology. The Church, while recognizing the longing of couples to achieve a pregnancy, also recognizes that achieving such a pregnancy "at any cost" involves a diminution of the dignity of woman, of man, of the marital relationship and that such a cost is too high. IVF is immoral. Furthermore, thanks to IVF we now have the seemingly insoluble problem of approximately 400,000 frozen embryos, frozen microscopic human beings who have parents who are morally responsible for them but who have either abandoned them to their frozen fate or who do not have the ability to rescue them. This kind of situation clearly diminishes our respect for life, further objectifies the innocent child and treats him or her like a product of the freezer section of the local market. This absurd fate of the innocent child is the product of a technology detached from morality, a technology which does not give proper regard to the dignity of the human person, the dignity of the woman, the dignity of the man, the dignity of the child. There are legitimate modalities which assist, very effectively I might add, married couples desiring to achieve and sustain a pregnancy and these do not involve IVF or freezing embryos or donor gametes or selective reductions or designer babies or gender selection or genetic testing, all of which further dehumanize and objectify the child. Good morality is good medicine. Good medicine respects the nature and dignity of the human person.

Abortion harms women. This is one of the signs often held by the proponents of life when advocating a deeper respect for life. Direct abortion undoubtedly kills an innocent human being and this fact alone should be sufficient for all of us to see its absolute immorality. Unfortunately, it appears that a fuller recognition of the immeasurable harm this procedure does to women will be necessary before this crime against humanity can be seen for what it is, the destruction of an innocent human being and a great harm to women. I do not believe there is any other freely chosen action which has a greater detrimental impact on women than abortion. This medical procedure is certainly a grave moral evil. This medical procedure is an assault, not only on the individual woman, but an assault on the dignity of women in general.

It often happens that the Church is accused of disdaining and condemning the joy of sexual expression and that all these moral laws are really about sex. Pope Benedict mentioned this in his Encyclical, Deus Caritas Est. "Doesn't the Church, with all her commandments and prohibitions, turn to bitterness the most precious thing in life? Doesn't she blow the whistle just when the joy, which is the Creator's gift, offers us a happiness which is itself a certain foretaste of the Divine?" In a word, no. The Church, because she sees, recognizes and seeks to defend the dignity of the human person, perhaps especially the dignity of women, is a strong shepherd in speaking out against those things which are immoral and which are contrary to the dignity of the human person. To do otherwise would be "imprudent silence."

WASHINGTON—"What does it mean to be human?" A new book by the priest who spearheads the evangelization and catechetical efforts of the U.S. bishops explores this question by drawing on the teachings of Pope John Paul II in his theology of the body. In *The Human Person: According to John Paul II*, published by Pauline Books and Media, Father J. Brian Bransfield examines the vision of humanity expressed by Pope John Paul II and uses it as the basis for a moral theology that offers practical guidance and support in living the Christian life.

Father Bransfield writes about the challenges raised by three social revolutions of the 20th Century – the industrial, sexual and technological revolutions – and how Pope John Paul's theology of the body responded to the resulting societal shifts. These shifts, Father Bransfield observes, have led to a disregard for women, the spread of cohabitation, the rise in divorce and the growing trend of fatherlessness. John Paul II challenged all of these trends. Father Bransfield shows how Christians today can overcome the negative consequences of these shifts through living the teaching of the theology of the body as an essential element of the new evangelization proclaimed by Pope John Paul II.

Father J. Brian Bransfield is a priest of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. He currently serves as the Assistant General Secretary and Executive Director of the Secretariat of Evangelization and Catechesis at the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. Father Bransfield holds a doctorate in moral theology from the Pontifical John Paul II Institute for Studies on Marriage and Family in Washington.

An ecological blind spot

Contraceptives are polluting women's bodies and the environment, but who cares? by Cristina Alarcon

There is a huge effort today to protect the physical environment from the unintended effects of human activity. We have international agreements and national policies to reduce global warming by curbing excess carbon, produced as human beings pursue their material wellbeing.

On a smaller scale, we each do our best to turn off the taps, turn down the lights, use public transport, cut down on the fumes, recycle, recycle, and definitely not flush any medicines down the sink – especially not the brain-altering or endocrine-disrupting kind. Yes, we are constantly seeking ways to reduce air and water <u>pollution</u>, and in Canada, the <u>Environment Act</u> even allows citizens to bring civil action when the government is not enforcing environmental laws.

But in spite of all our efforts, there are tell-tale signs that a particular type of pollutant, the <u>endocrine disruptor</u>, is wreaking havoc on our <u>ecosystems</u>. And as the world's rivers are in a crisis of ominous proportions, we are witnessing the <u>alarming effects</u> wrought by estrogenic substances on aquatic life. Feminized male fish that lay eggs and/or have lost their reproductive abilities have been found near waste water effluent areas.

There are also growing concerns about damage to the human body from

pollutants, although there appear to be no human data on long-term effects from this exposure. Not reassuringly, the World Health Organization <u>reports</u> that there are still many unknowns.

In an effort to curb pollution, Canada has recently declared bisphenol A a <u>toxic</u> substance under the Canadian Environmental Protection Act -- a great <u>victory</u> for environmentalists, and a huge relief for Canadians, as exposed rodents have shown signs of neurological and behavioural developmental problems.

Used in the making of clear, hard plastics, as well as food can liners, <u>BPA</u> is known as the "gender bending chemical". Even trace amounts found on some shopping <u>receipts</u> may contribute to impotence of male shoppers -- while boosting Viagra sales -- if they touch their mouths or handle food.

The endocrine disruptor has also been linked to low sex drive and DNA damage in sperm; it may disrupt female reproductive systems, and contribute to development of cancers and metabolic diseases. Its status is currently under review in Europe and the US.

But why are environmental <u>crusaders</u> hounding plastic manufacturers and the canned foods industry while ignoring the most obvious culprit: <u>pharmaceuticals</u> in our water supply? Not just what is dumped by manufacturers or consumers, but more importantly, what is flushed down the toilet after human consumption.

The fact remains that over the past 50 years countless millions of women have ingested <u>synthetic hormones</u> -- great endocrine disruptors -- to prevent conception, and excreted the waste product.

This is affirmed in a peer-reviewed <u>paper</u> by Alan D. Pickering of the Natural Environment Research Council, and John D Sumpter of Brunel University, who highlight that although some of the endocrine-disruptors are industrial chemicals, it seems clear that the most pervasive estrogens in the aquatic environment are steroids derived from human excretion. They readily admit that although, theoretically, the pill could be controlled at source, "the social implications of this would be totally unacceptable". Meanwhile, whether the pharmaceutical industry could develop "an effective but environmentally less persistent alternative...remains an open question."

Oh really? What makes hormonal contraception sacrosanct among other pollutants? Is it that there is absolutely no better way to guarantee women's "reproductive choice"? Or is there, behind that slogan, an attitude to the female body that is out of sync with ecological thinking and, if the truth be told, not concerned with real choices for women at all.

Think about it: if estrogenic contaminants aren't good enough for rodents or fish, why would women consume them? After all, women themselves suffer ill effects of hormonal contraceptives which are gradually being revealed, even as blogosphere chat rooms are increasingly flooded with expressions of personal malaise.

How many women know that in 2005 the World Health Organisation classified the contraceptive pill as a <u>Group I carcinogen</u> because of proven links with breast and some other cancers? Do they know that sex hormones can compromise the

<u>immune system?</u>

How about recent findings that show the Pill may skew the <u>biological cues</u> that help a woman choose a compatible mate? (Imagine getting off the Pill only to wake up one day and realize you are lying next to a man you loathe!) Again, German researchers have linked the Pill to female <u>sexual dysfunction</u>, and neurologists are concerned the progestin component may be affecting our ability to <u>think</u>. Alzheimer's anyone?

Actually, this gambling with women's wellbeing goes back to the beginnings of the pill in the 1950s when American scientists took advantage of poor Puerto Rican women, not informing them that they were being corralled into a medical experiment with potentially dangerous side effects. It has continued through the Depo Provera controversy to the recent Ortho Evra patch fiasco.

Yet, even as <u>lawsuits</u> over Evra are quietly settled in both the US and Canada -the British Columbia government is suing to recover past and future health care costs for damages inflicted on women -- as NBC <u>reports</u>, the millions paid out to victims is peanuts compared to the billions on profit sales.

How come after 50 years of militant feminism and environmentalism that nobody cares about the ecology of women's bodies and the integrity of their person? How much longer will women agree to be <u>guinea pigs</u> "for the sake of the planet" -- or for the sake of Big Pharma's profits?

And what may turn the tide? The threat of impotence and sterility among the male population?

If the driving force of contraception really is choice for women -- and not just social control of fertility -- there is an alternative, just as there are alternatives to plastics and cans, oil and coal if we really want to find them. In fact, we don't even have to look for a healthy method of family planning; it already exists.

<u>Fertility awareness</u>, or natural family planning, has been shown in scientific <u>studies</u> to be a highly effective method when couples are properly instructed and use the method consistently -- as is the case with hormonal and other methods.

It does require a change in lifestyle, but the biggest barrier to change now lies with healthcare professionals, most of whom just don't know enough about it, as a recent study co-authored by Dr. Ellen Wiebe at the Dept of Family Practice at the University of British Columbia clearly shows. In fact, most physicians underestimate the effectiveness of NFP, and only a small proportion of them provide information on this healthier option.

In a world increasingly preoccupied with conserving nature and singing the virtues of naturalness, this is an anomaly, to say the least. To continue along the path of promoting risky and polluting contraceptives while ignoring a wholesome alternative would look very like an ideological or commercial commitment, and nothing to do with women's reproductive health at all. Or care for the planet, for that matter.

Peter's Points to Ponder

During the Christmas season I was struck by a unique paradox.

"For a child will be born to us, a son will be given to us; And the government will rest on His shoulders; And His name will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Eternal Father, Prince of Peace" Isaiah 9:6

It was impossible not to notice that there were a larger number of parishioners in the pews, and the local parish offered additional Mass times than a 'normal' Sunday. So why were there more people gathered to worship? As Isaiah 9:6 proclaims "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given". The church was full because people had come to worship the child born that night over 2000 years ago in a lowly stable in Bethlehem. A simple, meager, and harmless birth of child – what is not to celebrate, right?

At first glance it may seem difficult to see the paradox; but, if the statistics are correct 97% of American Catholic women over the age of 18 have used some form of contraception. So if the birth of a child is something to be celebrated, why would so many people be so afraid of such an event? It's important to remember that the church calls couples to responsible parenthood, and does not dictate that they must have a large family in order to be 'good' Catholics. A couples timing and choice to have children should be controlled using the female's natural cycles of fertility.


